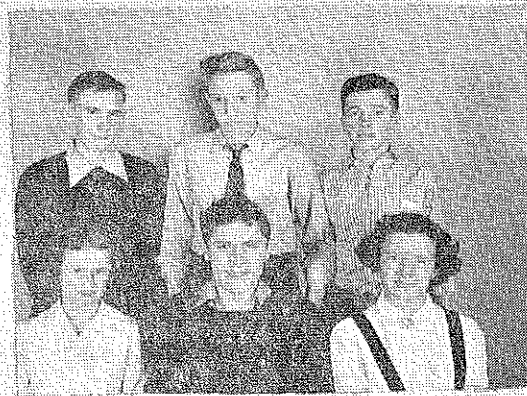
There they were given a ride by a Chinese Cooley. When they got off the boat, they were charged a Doty on their goods.

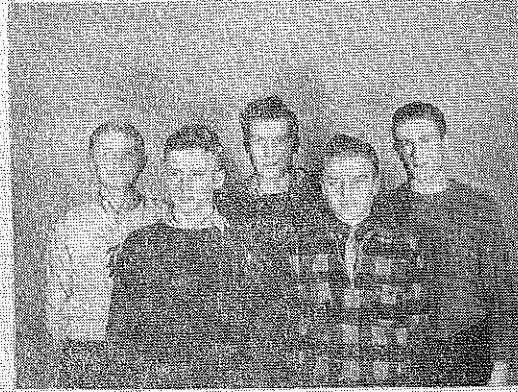

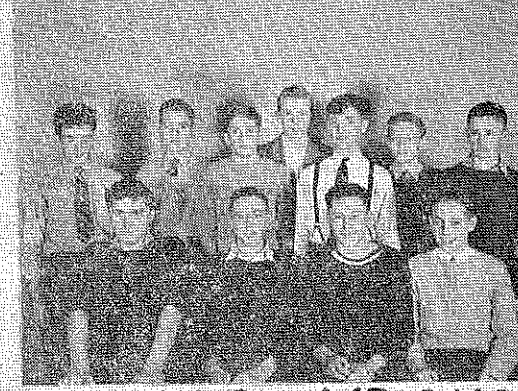

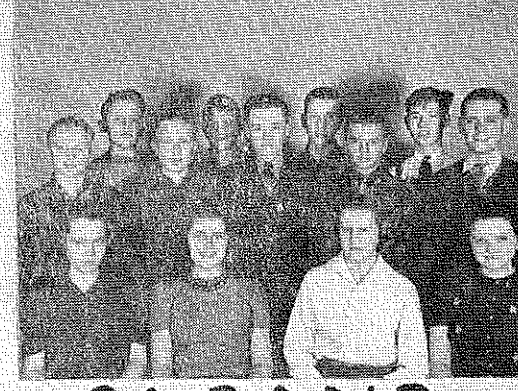
